



THE END OF THE END OF HISTORY *Kim Lane Scheppele, Princeton University* **October 2, 2017** 3:00 – 4:30pm *Smith 140*

After the collapse of the Soviet Union, Francis Fukuyama pronounced the "end of history" when it seemed that the world was moving toward a consensus on the establishment of liberal, democratic, constitutional governments. The lecture will examine Hungary, Poland, Russia, Turkey, Venezuela and Ecuador as models of the new illiberal constitutionalism. This lecture shows why liberal constitutionalists have been losing the battle for hearts and minds of angry publics and proposes the standard of "self-sustaining democracy" to spearhead the normative critique of these new regimes.

Professor Kim Lane Scheppele is the Laurance S. Rockefeller Professor of Sociology and International Affairs in the Woodrow Wilson School and the University Center for Human Values at Princeton. From 2017-2019, she will serve as the elected President of the Law and Society Association.
